## ITE EXECUTIVE BOARD MONTHLY MEETINGS

The full-day event also included a mentorship lunch, during which attendees from all of the participating schools had an opportunity to network with professionals in transportation, and a poster session featuring student research.

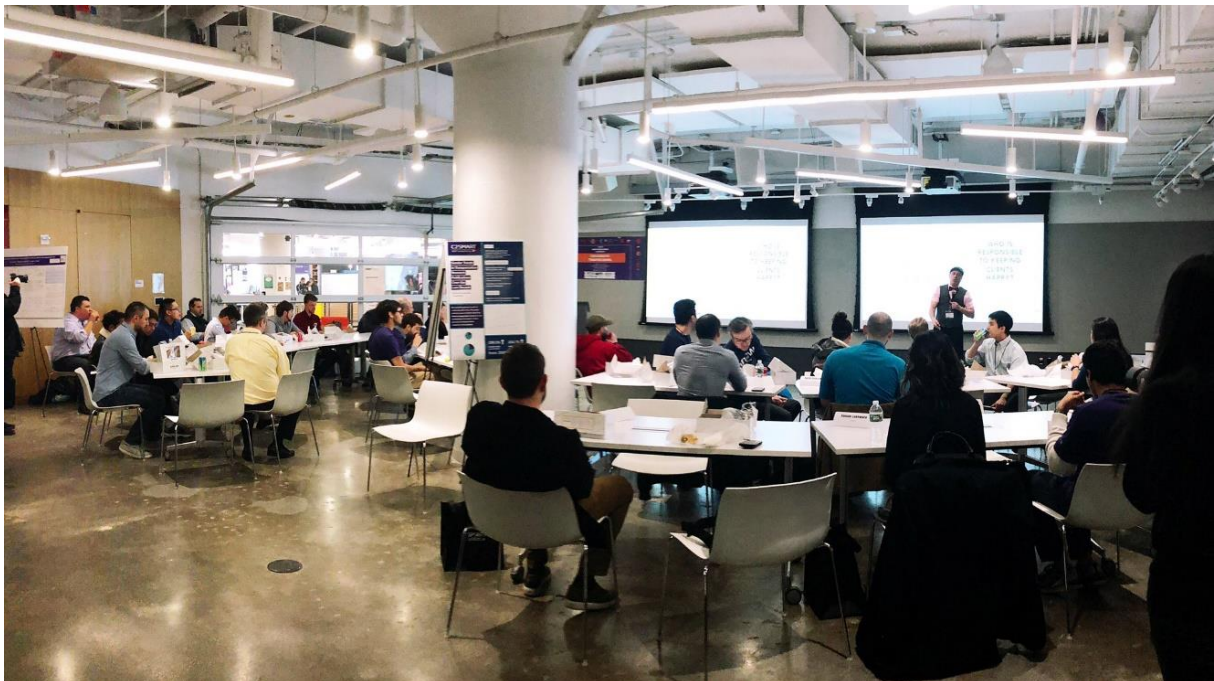

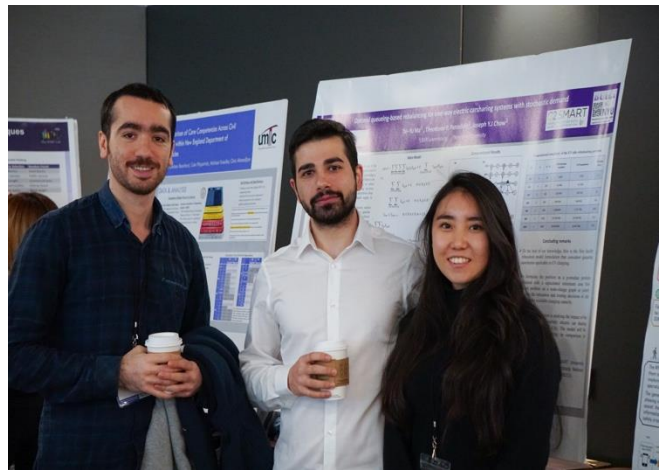
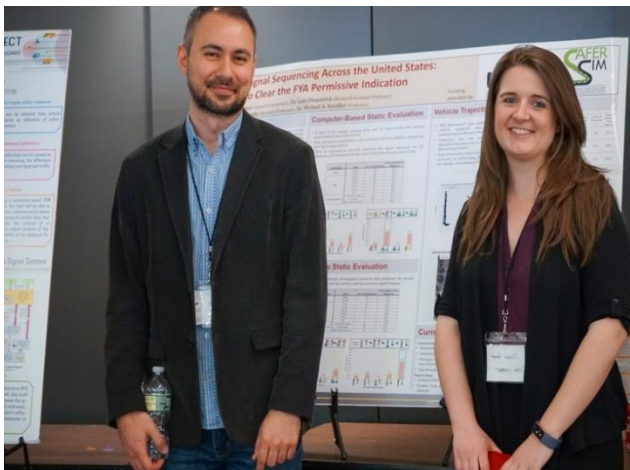
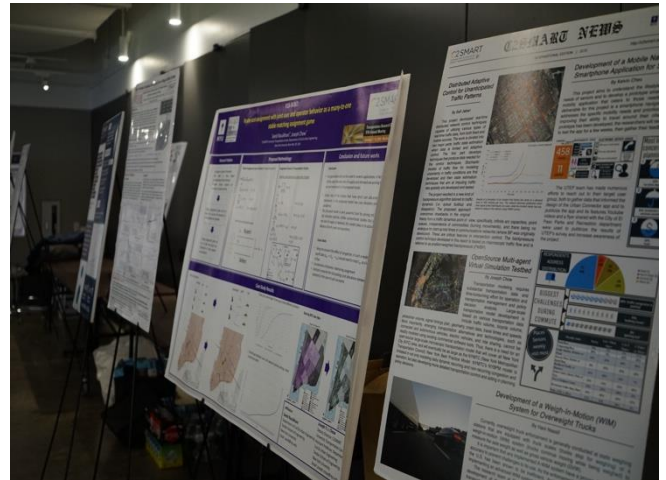
## ITE NORTHEASTERN DISTRICT MENTORSHIP SESSION

## ITE/ITS Kickoff Meeting 2020

The main agenda for the meeting was to reintroduce the Chapter to Tandon students, explain general functions and resources provided by ITE society and recruit new members. Two of the Tandon faculty members were present at the kick-off meeting – Prof. Jack Bringardner, and Prof. Joseph Chow. They gave short speeches welcoming students and talking about ITE purpose and benefits that come with being a part of it. NYU ITE chapter's presidents, Bruno and Mateo, spoke in detail about ITE student benefits, such as a free chapter membership and a free first-year national membership, upcoming events, and finally internship and job opportunities available to upperclassmen peers. In addition to many Tandon Students, NYU CUSP and Wagner students also joined the meeting.



## Transportation Camp NYC 2019

TransportationCamp was an “unconference” where sessions were determined and led by the attendees. Each single attendee has the opportunity to shape and lead the events by proposing the ideas they would like to discuss at the beginning of the day. TransportationCamp NYC 2020 was an all-day event and was opened to the public. NYU ITE student chapter acted as a volunteering group in this camp. There were 26 ITE officers and members who volunteered in assisting the event including the checking-in process, running session proposals, shuttling attendees to different locations and staffing the board.



## Women in Transportation Panel Discussion

Number of participants: 35

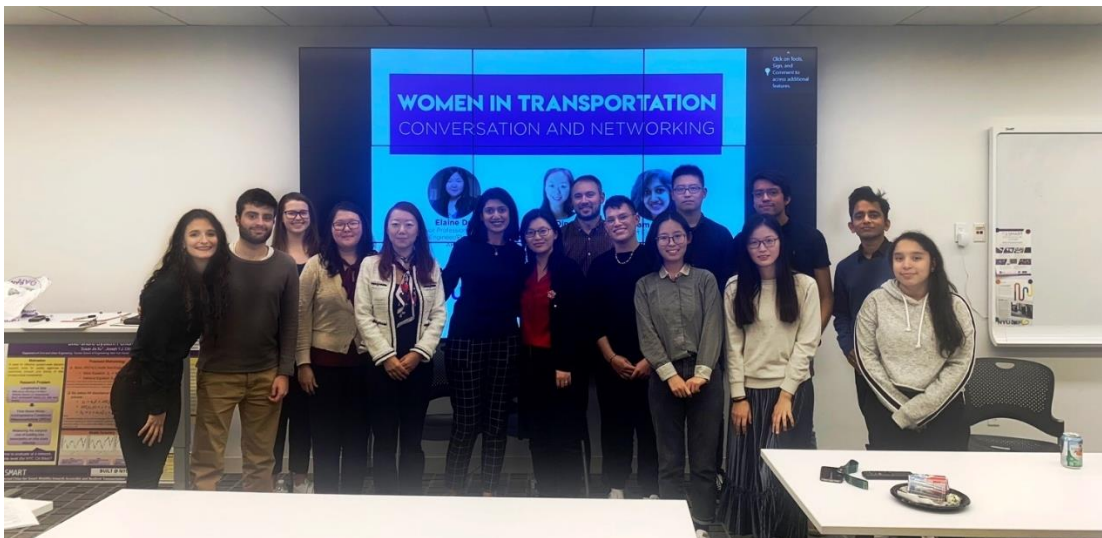
Being a part of the broader *Women at Tandon Initiative*, a formal effort to increase representation, retention and success of women in the science, technology, math and related fields, this event was a panel discussion between several leading women in the transportation industry in New York City. There were two editions of this series in the last year.

The first edition took place on March. The panelists worked for NYCDOT, NJSEA and Cambridge Systematics and the discussion was moderated by Jannie, our former ITE President for the year 2018-19. Approximately 22 students were in attendance and there was a lively audience Q&A following the event. This event gave students an opportunity to meet professional leaders and ask them questions about their career paths, solicit advice and better understand the day-to-day work of a transportation professional in New York.



The second edition took place on November 19, 2019. The panelists in this event worked for AKRF and the NJSEA. They were also active members of the ITE Met Section. The session was moderated by our current vice-president Suzana. The panel had an initial ice breaker, then, the discussion continued with a few more open questions. Lastly, we opened the floor up to three or four questions from the public. Refreshments were provided and it was also a networking opportunity for the chapter students to connect the professionals. This event was attended by 13 people.





## Fehr & Peers Transportation Consultants Information Session

Number of participants: 13

A networking event was held along with Fehr & Peers, a reputed consultancy company in transportation planning and engineering. Senior transportation engineer Delia Votsch flew all the way from California to interact with Tandon students and answer questions about the transportation industry, share insights about important projects and discuss career opportunities. It was a good session for chapter members to network with fellow students, practitioners, event attendees and the speaker.





## Field Trips/Technical Tours

A field trip to Google's office in Manhattan was hosted by the student chapter on August 2nd, 2019. A group with a mix of graduate, undergraduate students from NYU and high school students of the K-12 ARISE program visited the entire office and had a presentation of what a day in the life of a Data Scientist looks like. NYU-ITE members also participated in technical tour during the ITE Northeastern District Annual Meeting – visiting New Haven's city operations center, CTDOT Rail Maintenance center and Union Station. Our members were exposed to novel solutions like using image processing technique for road occupancy as well as getting to know the daily operations in the rail maintenance center and history of the Union Station.



## Service Projects

Members from NYU-ITE Chapter volunteered in the ITE YMC Fort Greene Park Clean-up event that happened on a Saturday, June 8, 2019. The participation in the event included assisting the park's Conservancy with weeding the park entrance landscaping and removing glass from the park's running trails. After helping in the park, the group headed for lunch and network in a restaurant nearby. Chapter members also volunteered in the Uni BUILD event in City Point, Brooklyn on October 6th., 2019 by assisting with setting up the furniture, facilitating Lego activities, making sure the participants were having fun and cleaning up.



## Game Night

# Resume Workshop

## ARISE Summer Program

In 2019, the UrbanMITS Lab participated in the NYU Tandon School of Engineering ARISE Summer program. The ITExITS Student Chapter was involved through their Vice-President, Suzana Duran Bernardes, and former President, Jingqin Gao. They were both key members in the selection process and mentoring of the students. The lab received two female high-school students, Jessica Katzman and Awestaa Zia, to perform different research tasks and develop a final project to present at the ARISE Colloquium.

Their project consisted in analyzing the effects of vehicle proximity to stress levels of cyclists riding in the Downtown Brooklyn area. They collected the distance between the bicycle and passing vehicles using ultrasonic sensors, a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver, a real-time clock (RTC) connected to a Raspberry Pi mounted to the bicycle. In addition, they collected the heartrate of cyclists while riding with the sensors by using a smartwatch. They combined both datasets and analyzed the results obtained from them. Their final results have shown that the proximity of vehicles to the bicycle is correlated to higher heartrates and will be used in future projects of the lab. They also had classes on SQL, ArcGIS and AIMSUN.

This type of program is really important in the formation of skilled future transportation planners and/or engineers. The ITExITS is proud to have been part of the program through our Vice-President and former President.

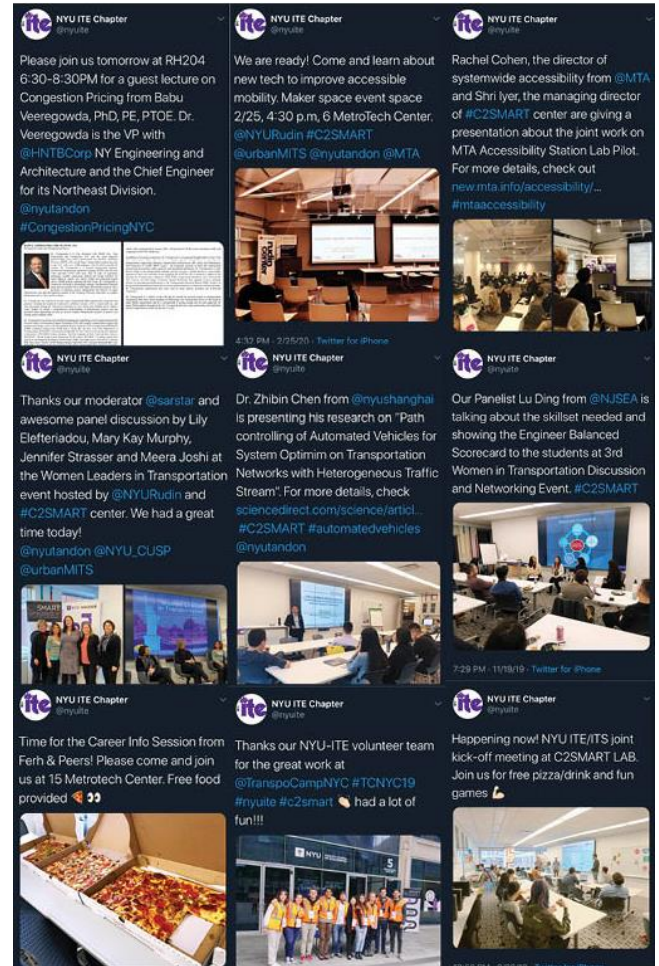
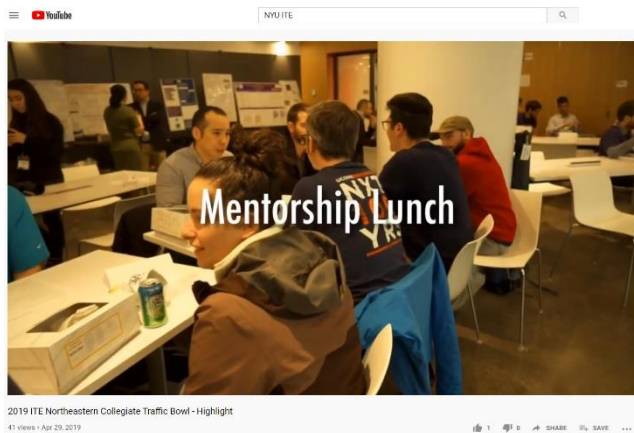
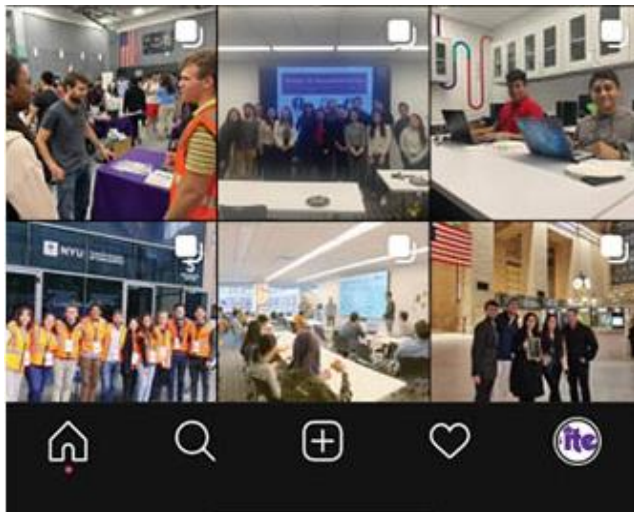
